Stats Hour: Analyzing Intensive Longitudinal Data with Group Iterative Multiple Model Estimation (GIMME)

Integrative Statement: Development is about time, and a key way to understand the developmental processes underlying adolescence is to study the interplay among biopsychosocial factors at short time scales using intensive longitudinal methods. These methods include functional magnetic resonance imaging, daily diaries with 30+ entries, coded observations, ecological momentary assessment, and physiological measurement. Intensive longitudinal data are increasingly being collected by developmentalists owing to rapid advancements in technology, and they have spawned interest and innovation in the statistical approaches required to analyze them. In this workshop, Dr. Adriene Beltz will present one such approach: Group Iterative Multiple Model Estimation (GIMME). GIMME is a personspecific temporal network analysis approach. It creates data-driven maps that show the direction of prediction among variables, and whether that prediction is concurrent or lagged in time and pertains to an entire sample or just to some individuals within it. Dr. Beltz will provide a conceptual introduction to GIMME, and then walk through a

# 5th Biennial Moral Development Preconference

Adolescence is an important period of life during which moral and prosocial understandings, motives, and behavior are paramount as adolescents' social milieus broaden and their awareness of social issues deepen. Scholars have made great progress in the past few decades going beyond a deficit framework by focusing on ways that a risk and resilience perspective may inform our understanding of healthy development in children and adolescents. The lens of the risk/resilience framework offers an intriguing opportunity to examine maturation of adolescent morality and prosociality as an antecedent and consequence of adaptation. With this fifth Moral Development preconference, we intend to stimulate an open discussion among researchers to reflect upon the question "How can a risk/resilience framework inform the study of moral development in adolescence?"

Keynote speakers Ann Masten and Velma McBride Murry will discuss their work on risk and resilience in adolescents and discuss in relation to understanding prosocial and moral development during this important developmental period. Thereafter, a panel consisting of notable scholars in the field of moral development will discuss the keynotes and draw connections with their own research. ## Meta Analysis Workshop Postconference Organized by Noel Card

This session introduces attendees to the process of metaanalysis and other systematic review techniques. The session consists of three parts. First, I describe the role of literature reviews in the accumulation of scientific evidence, responding to concerns about replication and the increasing number of studies in many fields. In the second and most extensive part of the session, I introduce the major steps of performing a meta-analysis. Specifically, attendees will be introduced to the techniques of performing a comprehensive and representative literature search, the process of systematically coding effect sizes and study characteristics, and analytic techniques to combine and compare effect sizes across studies. In the third part of the session, I will briefly compare meta-analysis to related techniques (e.g., integrative data analysis, other forms of systematic review) and discuss how a combination of primary studies, secondary studies, and meta-analyses lead to a model of knowledge accumulation in family science.

## 1-001. Sleep and the Developing Adolescent Brain: Implications for Behavior and Well-Being

Integrative Statement: Adolescence is a developmental period during which critical brain development takes place. Insufficient sleep is increasingly being called an epidemic in adolescence, raising the importance of understanding links between poor sleep and brain function. In this talk, Dr. Galvan will present a series of studies aimed at uncovering the relation between sleep disruption, impulsivity, and development of functional connectivity in the adolescent brain. She will also discuss recent research demonstrating the contextual factors, beyond media use, that contribute to sleep problems.

Biography: Dr. Adriana Galván is an Associate Professor of Psychology at UCLA whose expertise is in adolescent brain development. She received her B.A. from Barnard College. Columbia University and her PhD in Neuroscience from Cornell. She is the Director of the Developmental Neuroscience Laboratory. Her research is funded by the National Science Foundation, MacArthur Foundation, NIMH, NICHD, Jacobs Foundation, and the William T. Grant Foundation. She is the recipient of the APA Boyd McCandless Early Career Award, the William T. Grant Scholars Award, a Network Scholar of the MacArthur Foundation Research on Law and Neuroscience, the 2015 Distinguished Teaching Award from the UCLA Psychology Department, the 2016 APA Distinguished Scientific Award for Early Career Contributions and the 2016 Cognitive Neuroscience Society Young Investigator Award.

#### 1-005. Tips for Conducting International Research on **Adolescent Development**

Integrative Statement: Internationalization offers many benefits to individuals, institutions, and disciplines. Yet extending a research agenda across borders presents multiple challenges, discouraging many scholars from pursuing international activities. The goal of this session is to provide practical tips and resources for SRA members working (or interested in working) internationally. The session brings together distinguished scholars who conduct basic and applied research, and engage in academic training, across multiple countries and continents. Each brings a different set of experiences and perspectives from their extensive and varied international work around the globe. Collectively, they have mentored graduate students and young scholars from around the world; obtained funding to conduct interdisciplinary or international research; and disseminated their work through professional organizations and high quality journals. Panelists will give brief overviews of their international experience then respond to questions posed by the chair. Questions will cover both scientific and logistical issues, such as: • How can we elevate the value and importance of conducting international research to funding agencies and research journals, increasing likelihood of funding and publication? • What types of scientific issues are typically encountered in international research (e.g., methodological issues, measurement aspects)? • How can we address logistical issues in international work (e.g., IRB/ethical aspects, forming/leading productive research teams, dealing with budgetary and administrative aspects)? • How can graduate programs prepare young scholars to conduct international research? Integrative Statement: Understanding of adolescent brain development has dramatically increased in recent years due to advances in neuroimaging techniques. Moreover, studies examining social and emotional risk and protective factors in conjunction with neural markers have great potential to improve our knowledge of developmental trajectories of mental health. Neuroscience-informed research that incorporates assessment of social and emotional functioning also has potential for creating novel intervention and prevention programming based on how experiences impact the brain. Despite this potential, developmental science has yet to fully integrate neuroscience findings into developmental research. Abstract: Youth activism is not a new phenomenon, nevertheless, there is a dearth of knowledge on how municipal governments and youth development scholars work together in moving the needle forward. This workshop will challenge that notion by discussing how research on youth civic engagement, advancing racial equity, and sociopolitical development for health and well-being was used in one local community, Louisville, Kentucky. Participants in this workshop will be introduced to the Louisville Metro government Racial Equity Youth Council, also known as the Despite Oppression Pursue Excellence Youth Council (D.O.P.E.Y.C.), a group of 10 young people between the ages of 16-19 with the goal of empowering and advancing racial equity in the Louisville community using youth participatory action research. In partnership with a variety of sectors and engaging multiple youth voices and identities, this strategic initiative of the Louisville Metro Public Health and Wellness Center for Health Equity, in partnership with Mayor's SummerWorks and YouthBuild Louisville, took on the ambitious, yet necessary goal of creating action plans over a seven week intensive summer work program and developed a sustainable nine-month after school program to address structural barriers faced by young people who are not in school and unemployed. ### 1-024. A Social Justice Lens on Equity and Social Determinants of Health

Chair: Kimber Bogard

Integrative Statement: Speakers will present three papers describing ways in which research, services, and policies can advance greater equity by addressing complex social

determinants of health. A discussant will note major themes and next steps. The authors will present their work through a lens in which the status quo perpetuates disparities and where action is needed to promote equity within the contexts in which adolescents of color grow and develop. Thus, the papers advance the notion that if researchers, policymakers, and practitioners view their work through a social justice lens and aim to better understand the roots of inequity, they can become part of the solution. Gadsden calls out the complexity of problems associated with inequity and proposes that an intersectionality lens can address the multiplicity of identities associated with social determinants of health and their predicted outcomes. Diaz highlights the unique social situation of inner-city adolescents living in poverty and calls for a unique approach to provide health care to reduce disparities and promote equity. According to McBride Murry, in order to realize health equity, researchers must move beyond documenting the existence of disparities; use a lifespan perspective to evaluate various mechanisms and pathways to health equity; and evaluate policy regulations that sustain inequity in health outcomes. Toomer pulls these themes together in a call to address the public health crisis and social and health injustice of violence in Black communities. She calls on leaders to comprehensively analyze, examine, address and more urgently, remedy the factors leading to the present-day conditions.

Biography: Kimber Bogard, PhD is a senior officer at the National Academy of Medicine. In this role, she leads the planning effort at the National Academy of Medicine and catalyzes internal and external partnerships and collaborations to bridge Academies' consensus recommendations with implementation to have a greater impact on health. As the managing officer of the \$10 million Culture of Health Program, in partnership with the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. Kimber works with communities. researchers, and key decision-makers to find solutions to health inequities and disparities in the United States. Previously, she directed the Board on Children, Youth and Families at the Academies where she oversaw a portfolio of projects on children's health and development. In 2006, she received her PhD from Fordham University in applied developmental psychology, and she holds a master's degree from Columbia University-Teachers College.

### 1-026. Critical Race Perspective in Developmental Science

Integrative Statement: Research focused on the racialized experiences of racial and ethnic minority youth have flourished in the developmental literature since the Civil Rights Movement in the 1960s. Despite advancements in the study of racial-ethnic identity development, perceived racialethnic discrimination, and racial-ethnic socialization (e.g., García Coll et al., 1996; Hughes et al., 2006), gaps and limitations remain in the literature. For instance, it is not uncommon for studies to overlook the unique racialized history and sociopolitical context of the racial and ethnic minority groups under investigation. Unfortunately, forgoing such context obscures the process through which one can meaningfully draw conclusions from examining the experiences and psychological consequences of multiple and intersecting forms of oppression and identities. Critical Race theory (CRT; Bell, 1992; Delgado & Stafancic, 2012) can inform many of these issues and further advance the study of racial and ethnic minority adolescent research. CRT is a valuable framework for the research process as the discourse on race and racism serves as its foundation, and thus, guides

the development of hypotheses, the methodology, as well as the interpretation and implications of results. Accordingly, our round table will focus on how CRT can inform adolescent research with a panel of racially and ethnically diverse scholars who will share their related research projects on racial socialization for Asian American adolescents, gender and racial discrimination among African American adolescents, and identity and discrimination among Native American adolescents. This interactive session will then open up for a discussion with the audience to continue the conversation.

## 1-029. Mixed method approaches to capturing support across youths' social networks

Integrative Statement: Supportive relationships with adults and peers are essential to youth development; promoting positive academic, behavioral, and psychological outcomes (Chu, 2010), while also buffering against negative outcome such as substance abuse (Curran, 2007; Li et al., 2011). Each relationship is embedded in a larger ecology of relationships and supports (Zaff et al., 2016). The exact nature of social supports offered, and how the supports manifest within relationships, is multidimensional and complex. Research exploring the relationships present in youths' lives typically examines their structure or content, focusing primarily on relationships as social networks (Mitchell & Tricket, 1980). Drawing upon these areas of inquiry, new research suggests that the relationships a young person has with peers and adults are part of an interconnected web of supports, where a variety of relationships coalesce in different contexts to offer varying types and levels of social supports (Schwartz & Rhodes, 2016; Varga & Zaff, 2017). However, research methods that fully capture the intersection of the social supports and networks that comprise a young person's web are not fully developed. This roundtable brings together researchers who attempt to capture this complexity by utilizing mixed methods. The panelists will discuss the quantitative and qualitative methods they have used to assess social networks and social supports and their implications for youth development, and engage the audience in a discussion about the affordances of these methods in an effort to build a collective approach to this research. # 1-043. 2018 SRA International Fellow Address: From the Biomedical to the Wounds Inside: Re-conceptualizing Health in War

Integrative Statement: This presentation focuses on the effects of war on health. Drawing on the Palestinian experience of chronic protracted war and displacement with no end in sight, it demonstrates that available indicators of the effects of war on health such as destruction of infrastructure, numbers dead, injured and disabled are necessary to assess the effects of war on health, but not sufficient. Other locally and regionally developed measures important for revealing the suffering endured by survivors will be discussed. Based on lived experience and research, this presentation highlights the need to re-conceptualize and develop new metrics to assess the effects of war on health which go beyond classical measures. The foundation concept of social suffering is identified as a key concept to use when trying to understand what happens to the health of survivors in war, linking social suffering to 'subjective' and objective health indicators.

Biography: Rita Giacaman is a professor of public health at the Institute of Community and Public Health, Birzeit University, occupied Palestinian territory. A founding member of the Institute, she was a researcher/practitioner in the 1980's Palestinian social action, which led to the development of the Palestinian primary health care model. In the 1990s. she participated in building the Palestinian community based disability rehabilitation network. Since 2000, she has been focusing on the impact of chronic war-like conditions and exposure to violence on the health and well being of Palestinians, with an emphasis on psychosocial health among adolescents and young people; and the development of measures to assess health and well-being in conditions of protracted violence. She has published extensively locally and internationally. Rita was awarded an Honorary PhD from LSE in 2011 for having made an "outstanding contribution to the increased understanding or appreciation of 'the causes of things'..."

Integrative Statement: This roundtable is a product of the Society for Research on Adolescence's (SRA) sponsored working group focused on integrating an intersectional lens in the developmental sciences. Several recent and current events bring to the forefront the impact of intersectional and overlapping systems of oppressions and inequities, such as police brutality resulting in the deaths of several young Black men and women, the murders of transgender women of color, increasing evidence of school pushout among diverse youth, and growing economic disparities among young people in the U.S. An intersectional lens can help us better attend to overlapping systems of oppression and affordances. At its core, intersectionality perspectives have argued that multiple systems of oppression intersect to shape individual's lives by perpetuating certain inequities and privileges (Combahee River Collective, 1977; Crenshaw, 1989). Scholars have argued for the urgent need for an intersectional lens; however, these calls are typically not situated within the developmental sciences (e.g., Cole, 2009). This roundtable will offer a lively discussion of the challenges and benefits of incorporating intersectionality into contemporary theoretical, empirical, and methodological issues in developmental research. Panelists will draw on theoretical examples of how developmental science can transform itself to better attend to intersecting oppressions and affordances. *Integrative Statement:* This roundtable will be dedicated to discussing Erikson's "Identity: Youth and Crisis" published exactly fifty years ago. The book is an important milestone in the history of the study of identity and of adolescence. The roundtable is intended to advance a reflective discussion of Erikson's continued relevance and contribution to the study of identity development in adolescence and beyond. Erikson's work has been seminal in generating the Ego Identity Status framework (James Marcia and colleagues) and the Narrative framework for studying Identity (Dan McAdams and colleagues) to mention only two research traditions. Many however recognize that Erikson's writings display a richness that transcends the particulars of the perspectives mentioned and contain ideas not followed through in later theoretical formulations and empirical work. # 1-062. Education, Inequality, and Opportunity in America

Integrative Statement: The "American Dream" promises young people in America equal educational and economic opportunity. And education is widely imagined to be the pathway to economic opportunity. But are our schools engines of equal opportunity or agents of inequality? To answer this, I use a new dataset—based on 300 million test score records from every public school in the United States—to describe the landscape of educational opportunity in America, with a particular focus on how opportunity is distributed by race, ethnicity, and social class. The data show that economic inequality and segregation play powerful roles in shaping educational opportunity. Schooling, in contrast, appears to only modestly impact patterns of inequality. It will take more than improved schools to make the American Dream a reality.

**Biography:** Sean Reardon is the endowed Professor of Poverty and Inequality in Education and is Professor (by courtesy) of Sociology at Stanford University. His research focuses on the causes, patterns, trends, and consequences of social and educational inequality, the effects of educational policy on educational and social inequality, and in applied statistical methods for educational research. In addition, he develops methods of measuring social and educational inequality (including the measurement of segregation and achievement gaps) and methods of causal inference in educational and social science research. He teaches graduate courses in applied statistical methods, with a particular emphasis on the application of experimental and guasi-experimental methods to the investigation of issues of educational policy and practice. Sean received his doctorate in education in 1997 from Harvard University. He is a member of the National Academy of Education and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He is also a recipient of the William T. Grant Foundation Scholar Award, the National Academy of Education Postdoctoral Fellowship, and an Andrew Carnegie Fellow.

# 1-064. Where are We Going and How do We Get There? Character, Virtue & Thriving

Integrative Statement: In the recent decades positive approaches to adolescent development like positive youth development, thriving, and flourishing have captured the academy's attention as a means to promote the understanding and practice of optimal development. Of late, the notion of character development, which has been part of education and youth serving curriculums for years, has challenged developmentalists' notions of promoting positive development. Although moral character is typically described in stable, trait-like terms, we propose a roundtable that highlights developmental approaches (King, Schnitker, & Houltberg, 2018; Lerner & Callina, 2014; Sokol, Hammond, Berkowitz, 2010). The roundtable convenes leading scholars from distinct sub-disciplines to present their perspectives on the role of character development in thriving. Panelists will address 1) their conceptualization of the "endpoint" or telos (purpose or goal of development), 2) their understanding of virtue and character development, 3) virtue/character's role in promoting and sustaining optimal development in youth, and 4) subsequent methodological recommendations. Richard Lerner will address character development from a relational developmental systems perspective. Daniel Lapsley will emphasize the importance of the availability and accessibility of virtue-schemas and conditions of activation in character formation. Drawing from personality psychology, moral psychology, positive psychology, and developmental systems theory, Sarah Schnitker will present a model of virtue conceptualized as hybrid personality units that combine characteristic adaptations with transcendent narrative identity. Bryan Sokol will highlight the role of psychosocial processes underlying character development such as selfregulation, perspective-taking, and identity-formation. William Damon will discuss purpose as a character strength that facilitates thriving during adolescence and beyond.

Integrative Statement: Intersectionality refers to the idea that broader systems of power, privilege and oppression interlock to give meaning to social categories, like race, gender, social class, and sexuality (e.g., Shields, 2008). The intersectionality framework originated in legal studies and feminist scholarship as a way to explain systemic inequalities and discrimination among adults (Crenshaw, 1989), and has slowly gained traction in the field of psychology (Cole, 2009). But, as the framework has moved across disciplines and stages of development (Carbado, 2008), new questions have been asked of it. One question for identity scholars within psychology is how to operationalize and measure intersectionality across developmental periods in the absence of identity-relevant, age-appropriate intersectionality measures. Thus, uncertainty remains about what counts as intersectionality research (Cho et al., 2013), particularly in identity scholarship. This roundtable invites a diverse. interdisciplinary group of preeminent identity scholars— Mesmin Destin (Northwestern University; social psychology/education), Negin Ghavami (UCLA; education), Eleanor Seaton (Arizona State University; developmental psychology/human development), and Moin Sved (University of Minnesota; psychology)—to discuss how they operationalize intersectionality in their empirical identity-based scholarship. Panelists draw from different theoretical orientations of identity, and collectively, the expertise spans developmental stages (early adolescence to emerging adulthood), multiple methodological approaches (experiments, interviews, surveys), and diverse social identities (race/ethnicity, social class, gender, sexuality, academics/education). Onnie Rogers (Northwestern University; psychology) will moderate a conversation that threads together theory, measurement, and analysis with regard to conducting intersectionality research on identity development and the implications for the larger identity literature.

# 2-001. Peer Victimization, Dating Violence, & Mental Health Issues among Sexual & Gender Minority Youth: Building Protective Schools and Communities

Integrative Statement: Sexual and gender minority youth (SGMY) and gender minority populations often experience elevated levels of peer victimization, truancy, depression, and suicidal behaviors than their straight-identified peers (Espelage, Birkett, Aragon, & Koenig, 2008; Robinson & Espelage, 2012). Further, recent studies suggest that SMY have greater odds of physical dating violence victimization than non-SMGYs (Espelage et al., 2016; Lou, Stone, & Tharp, 2014; Martin-Story, 2015). In this plenary session, research on risk and protective factors associated with victimization among SMGY will be discussed. School-based interventions will be reviewed that are showing progress in reducing victimization among these youth, including interventions that have focused on policies, professional development, building trusting relationships, technology-based efforts, and school climate improvement approaches. Priorities for future research will be presented.

Biography: Dorothy L. Espelage, Ph.D., Professor of Psychology, University of Florida, is the recipient of the APA Lifetime Achievement Award in Prevention Science and the 2016 APA Award for Distinguished Contributions to Research in Public Policy, and is a Fellow of APS, APA, and AERA. She earned her Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology from Indiana University in 1997. She has authored over 180 peer- reviewed articles, six edited books, and 70 chapters on bullying. homophobic teasing, sexual harassment, dating violence, and gang violence. Her research focuses on translating empirical findings into prevention and intervention programming and she has secured over nine million dollars of external funding. She authored a 2011 White House Brief on bullying among LGBTQ youth and attended the White House Conference in 2011. She was a consultant to the National Institutes of Health Pathways to Prevention Initiative to address bullying and youth suicide.

# 2-005. Social Media: Risks and Opportunities for Adolescent Development

Moderator: Jacqueline Nesi

Integrative Statement: The use of social media, or digital tools that allow users to share content and interact socially with others, has seen rapid growth among adolescents in recent years. Estimates suggest that as many as 89% of adolescents belong to a social networking site like Instagram or Snapchat, with 71% belonging to more than one (Lenhart, 2015). A full 92% of adolescents go online daily, and threequarters have access to smart phones with which to do so (Lenhart, 2015). As adolescents turn to social media at unprecedented rates and with staggering frequency, it becomes critical to examine the role of social media in the lives of young people. While early research on social media was primarily limited to examining overall frequencies of use. newer investigations emphasize specific online behaviors, as well as individual characteristics that may shape use. This Data Blitz brings together leaders in the field, conducting cutting-edge research on this increasingly ubiquitous phenomenon. Panelists will present results gleaned from innovate methodological approaches, ranging from observationally-coded social networking data to daily diary assessments. Topics to be covered include associations between social media use and adolescent well-being (e.g.,

mood and anxiety symptoms, engagement in health risk behaviors), individual differences in use, online self-presentation, and social media as tool for risk identification and intervention. Panelists will discuss the risks and benefits of social media for youth, and will highlight the growing need for research to keep pace with adolescents' rapid adoption of new technologies.

### (ES Session) Stats Hour: Analyzing Intensive Longitudinal Data with Group Iterative Multiple Model Estimation (GIMME)

Integrative Statement: Development is about time, and a key way to understand the developmental processes underlying adolescence is to study the interplay among biopsychosocial factors at short time scales using intensive longitudinal methods. These methods include functional magnetic resonance imaging, daily diaries with 30+ entries, coded observations, ecological momentary assessment, and physiological measurement. Intensive longitudinal data are increasingly being collected by developmentalists owing to rapid advancements in technology, and they have spawned interest and innovation in the statistical approaches required to analyze them. In this workshop, Dr. Adriene Beltz will present one such approach: Group Iterative Multiple Model Estimation (GIMME). GIMME is a person-specific temporal network analysis approach. It creates data-driven maps that show the direction of prediction among variables, and whether that prediction is concurrent or lagged in time and pertains to an entire sample or just to some individuals within it. Dr. Beltz will provide a conceptual introduction to GIMME, and then walk through a practical application, including data collection and preparation as well as GIMME analysis in R.

# 2-008. Combatting Sex Trafficking among Child Welfare-Involved Youth

Integrative Statement: When most people hear "human trafficking", they think of the movie, Taken, or foreign nationals smuggled into the US. However, multiple cases of domestic human trafficking have been reported in all 50 states. There are numerous risk factors associated with youth sex trafficking which include any set of experiences that may lead to increased emotional or physical vulnerability. These experiences include a history of neglect or abuse, low selfesteem, poverty, and foster care placement. In 2014, P.L. 113-183, the Preventing Sex Trafficking and Strengthening Families Act was implemented to benefit children and youth. Later that same year, the Children's Bureau awarded grants to nine agencies and organizations. Three of the states awarded these grants - Arizona, Maryland, and North Carolina - identified training gaps among child welfare professionals as a problem. As a result, they developed multidisciplinary approaches to training in order to improve the identification and protection of children and youth at risk of sex trafficking. All three panelists aim to ensure that children and youth who have been sex trafficked or are at risk for being trafficked have access to an array of comprehensive, high-quality services. Items of discussion include initial findings on collaboration and the degree to which the projects are increasing awareness of human trafficking. Integrative Statement: Relationships are the foundation for youth development. Much of empirical research on relationships has examined how one important adult can impact youth development (Chang et al., 2010; Schwartz & Rhodes, 2016). While this research has provided great insights into how youth-adult relationships (YARs) are promoted and sustained in individual settings (e.g., mentoring programs, classrooms), little is known about how these dyadic relationships are related to one another (Varga & Zaff, 2017). Several researchers have begun to examine YARs from a developmental systems perspective; where each person in a relationship influences and is influenced by the other person, and each dyadic relationship is embedded within a broader ecology of relationships, supports, opportunities, and barriers (Zaff et al., 2016). Research that intentionally examines the constellation of supportive adults in youth's lives across contexts would provide a fuller understanding about programs and policies that could optimize the potential of supportive relationships for youth. The panelists are experts in YARs in various settings who have utilized developmental systems frames in their research. Panelists will discuss the various methods they have used to better understand the structures and processes of youth-adult relationships across contexts, with a particular focus on data collection and analytic techniques. Further, the panelists will discuss challenges and opportunities they have encountered. The audience will be invited to share methods they have used and discuss how to better promote and integrate developmental systems perspectives into research and practice. Integrative Statement: The Adolescent Brain Cognitive Development (ABCD) study is a large multi-site longitudinal study supported by the National Institutes of Health to increase our understanding of how diverse experiences during adolescence interact with changing biology to influence brain, cognitive, and social/emotional development. study launched in 2015 and data collection began in the fall of 2016. The study is combining measures of developmental psychology, neuroimaging, cognitive neuroscience, genetics, and epidemiology with advanced techniques in bioassays. bioinformatics, and mobile assessment to follow ~11,500 9-10 year olds recruited at 21 sites around the country. Participants and their families complete comprehensive behavioral assessments of mental health, substance use. cognitive function, social function, and personality as well as a two-hour brain imaging protocol that includes structural, diffusion tensor, resting-state, and task-based scans. This symposium brings together representatives from the ABCD Research Consortium to present the goals of the study and its design, a description of the demographic characteristics of the emerging cohort, and a first look at baseline data on the first 6000+ children recruited, including measures of: 1) neurocognition and risk for substance abuse; 2) cultural and environmental risk and protective factors; and 3) brain imaging probes of neurodevelopment. In addition, we will highlight the open-science format of the ABCD study through data sharing and the impact of big data science.

Biography: Dr. Brown is a Distinguished Professor in two UC San Diego departments: Psychology and Psychiatry. Her pioneering studies of youth addiction and adolescent development have led to 26 federally funded grants including the current National Consortium on Alcohol and Neurodevelopment in Adolescence (NCANDA) and Adolescent Brain Cognitive Development (ABCD), which is the largest longitudinal study of youth development ever funded by NIH. In addition to over 300 peer reviewed publications and one book (Adolescent Substance Abuse, Oxford Press), she has served as President of the Society of Addiction Psychology and on the Board of Directors of the American Psychological Association and Research Society on Alcoholism. She has received multiple national awards for research service and mentoring in addition to international engagement. She is involved in addiction prevention and intervention at the regional, state, and national levels and helped lead NIAAA's effort to establish national screening and early intervention guidelines for youth. She has also simultaneously directed the development of clinical, education and research activities as the Chief of Psychology at the Veterans Affair Health Services System in San Diego. She earned her Ph.D. in clinical psychology at Wayne State University in 1981, and is licensed as a psychologist by the California Board of Psychology.

# 2-028. Thinking Critically and Consciously: New Extensions of Old Wisdom

Integrative Statement: Critical consciousness (CC) development is emerging as a core framework in scholarship on adolescent development. Conceptualized as critical reflection (ability to recognize inequitable social conditions), sociopolitical efficacy (feeling empowered to change those conditions), and critical action (taking action to make change), CC is vital to our current sociopolitical context. Growing evidence suggests that CC can act as an "antidote to oppression," and that higher CC are associated with improved socioeomotional, educational, and occupational outcomes among marginalized youth. Scholars are now digging deeper to explore predictors of CC and investigate how its components - reflection, efficacy, and action - interplay and jointly relate to outcomes. As research on CC as a core developmental competency grows, the time is ripe to explore theoretical and methodological connections between CC and other areas of scholarship concerned with social justice and social change. For example, CC is typically conceived as most germane for youth who are marginalized. Intersectional

perspectives could push CC scholarship forward by complicating notions of who is "marginalized" and how. This roundtable brings together scholars thinking creatively about these connections. We will engage in lively discussion about how CC scholarship can meaningfully interface with fundamental theories and perspectives including intersectionality, intergroup relations, racial socialization, and empowerment. Erin Godfrey (Associate Professor, New York University) will moderate the session. # 2-029. Realizing the promise of mixed methods: Using a cloud-based data application for longitudinal, mixed methods research

Abstract: Mixed methods research, research that combines quantitative and qualitative methods and data, is increasingly common in adolescent research. According to Tolan & Deutsch (2016): "mixed methods enriches the sophistication and utility of description and explanation in the developmental sciences and, thus, ultimately enriches developmental science as a whole" (pg. 714). Yet a common challenge for researchers engaged in mixed methods research is how to handle the large volumes of data generated in such projects. This is further complicated by the need to be able to integrate different types of data during analysis. For longitudinal research, strategies for integrating time into analysis creates a third level of potential challenge. This workshop focuses on strategies for managing and analyzing longitudinal, mixed methods data in developmental research projects. We will introduce a cloud-based application, Dedoose, that facilitates mixed methods data organization and analysis, and provide an introduction to its key features. We will then present a case study of a project as an example to demonstrate analytic strategies for longitudinal, mixed methods projects and illustrate how the application can be used in such research. Attendees will have a chance to ask questions about analytic strategies for their own work, discuss potential uses of the application for their projects, and try out features of the application.

Integrative Statement: Developing a sense of identity is a key developmental task, as it provides a sense of continuity despite changes within ourselves and the world around us. This roundtable discussion highlights methodological and theoretical challenges in studying continuity and change in narrative identity, broadly defined as the study of life stories. These life stories are often examined with cross-sectional designs, but are currently increasingly included in longitudinal designs. In this roundtable, we will discuss how to optimally benefit from these advances and how deal with the challenges that come with these advances. Potential solutions will have implications that extend beyond the narrow confines of those concerned with narrative identity. The panel consists of four members, all with different backgrounds. Specifically, Jennifer Pals-Lilgendahl started studying narratives from her background in personality psychology, Theo Klimstra started including narratives to better understand changes in commitment and exploration, Py Liv Erikson derives narratives from the identity status interview, and Moin Syed uses mixedmethods approaches to understand how individuals navigate

multiple identities. The discussion will start out from three questions. First, we will discuss how longitudinal research could inform existing broad theories on adolescent development when including multiple measurements of narratives. Second, we will discuss issues regarding research design (e.g., prompting for the same or different (kind of) narratives) based on the panel members' experiences. Third, panel members will discuss and brainstorm about what kind of research questions could be addressed. This roundtable thus presents a collaborative effort to further research on identity.

# 2-043. Familial and Neurobiological Underpinnings of Adolescent Identity: A Developmental Perspective Chair: Rita Žukauskienė

Integrative Statement: In adolescence, changing life circumstances, together with biological and cognitive development, trigger identity formation (Erikson, 1968). Adolescent can explore different alternatives and reflect on their own commitments, in order to enact meaningful identity choices. in line with their plans and talents (Marcia, 1966). In this process, adolescents show stylistic differences in their reliance on different strategies to process self-relevant information (identity styles; Berzonsky, 1989). However, it is largely unknown how identity styles develop in adolescence. Furthermore, identity research has focused primarily on outcomes and processes associated with identity formation. Far less attention has been devoted to understanding the role of familial and neurobiological factors of this process. Recently, scholars have examined the relationships between identity processes and parenting dimensions, showing that relationships with parents are strongly interlinked with identity explorations (Beyers & Goossens, 2008; Roth, Assor, et al., 2009); however, those links are rarely addressed longitudinally. Another line of the research address the neurological processes related to the identity development and goal-directed behavior (Mills & Tamnes, 2014, Reid et al. 2010), however, it remains unknown how neurological processes accompanying changes in information seeking and motivation predict identity over time. Therefore, the general purpose of this symposium is to take a closer look at the stability and change of identity statuses in adolecence and the role of familial and neurobiological factors influencing this change. Specifically, Žukauskienė and colleagues will present the study, examining for the first time multiple indices of change and stability (mean level changes, rank-order stability, and profile stability) in Berzonsky's (1989, 2011) identity styles in a four-annual-wave longitudinal study with adolescent boys and girls from Lithuania. Second, Kaniušonytė and Žukauskienė will examine the links between relationships with parents and identity processing styles (informational, normative and diffuse-avoidant) using the data from the four waves of a longitudinal project, conducted in Lithuania. Becht and colleagues will present a multi-method multi sample longitudinal study, conducted in the Netherlands, aimed to investigate how behavioral changes in goal-directed behavior and structural changes in the prefrontal cortex (PFC) and Nucleus accumbens (NAcc) gray matter volume predicted identity

Biography: Dr. Rita Žukauskienė is a professor at the Institute of Psychology, Mykolas Romeris University, Lithuania. She is constantly involved in studying human psychological development (particularly, during adolescence and emerging adulthood), as well as the factors related to positive development. She published over 30 publications in major international peerreviewed scientific journals, as well as other 120 papers in other national or international journals (h-index = 24; i10-index = 36, Retrieved in June 2017, from Google Scholar Citations). She extensively publishes on identity formation and civic engagement during adolescence. Her achievements were recognized in Lithuania, granting her the National Award for Excellence in Sciences in 2012 for the "Study of Psychological Well- being of

formation.

Rita Žukauskienė was the principal organizer of the XIV European Conference on Developmental Psychology (2009), 12th Conference of the European Association for Research on Adolescence (2010), and the 24th Meeting of the International Society for the Study of Behavioral Development (2016), what also documents her experience and international recognition in the field developmental studies. Currently, she is a President of the European Association for Research on Adolescence.

Integrative Statement: Empirical evidence asserts that ethnic-racial socialization (E-RS) is associated with positive youth developmental outcomes, including academic achievement (Hyungh & Fuligni, 2008), ethnic-racial identity development (Rivas-Drake, Hughes, & Way, 2009), and socioemotional well-being (Neblett, Banks, Cooper, & Smalls-Glover, 2013). Much of what we know about E-RS has centered on the experiences of youth of color and focused on parents as socializing agents. While it is essential for families to prepare youth of color to live in a world in which they are exposed to inequities associated with their race and ethnicity, the field must also focus on how all youth are racially socialized and debunk "the fallacy that only non-White 'have' race" (Burton et al., 2010, p. 453). There is a dearth of information about (1) E-RS processes occurring within academic and community spaces and (2) processes by which White youth are socialized to interact with others in a hyperracialized society. The purpose of this roundtable is to discuss challenges and strategies associated with discussing race with youth from all racial backgrounds across developmental stages (from early childhood through emerging adulthood and beyond) in the context of components that are essential to success in the academy: teaching, research, and service. Panelists (Chang Su-Russell and Drs. Chelsea Derlan, Margaret Hagerman, Anthony James, and Antoinette Landor) represent

interdisciplinary backgrounds and share a commitment to understanding the ways in which ER-S processes for racial minority (with a focus on African American, Mexican-origin, and Asian American) and majority youth can positively influence youth development processes.

Whenever possible, their work should leave the lab, enter the community, and positively impact the lives of marginalized and vulnerable youth. # 2-062. Neural, Inflammatory, and Genomic Reactivity to Social Stress: Implications for Lifespan Health

Integrative Statement: The human brain, immune system, and genome are exquisitely sensitive to cues indicating possible threat. This highly conserved, biological response to adversity is critical for survival during times of actual physical threat or injury. In the contemporary social environment, however, this multi-level response pattern is most frequently activated by perceived threats in the social environment. most of which are not currently present and some of which may never actually occur. This heightened psychobiological reactivity to social threat is unlikely to foster disease in adolescents who are otherwise healthy. If repeatedly engaged, however, such responses can promote the development of an increasingly pro-inflammatory phenotype that eventually becomes a key phenomenon driving the pathogenesis of several chronic disease conditions in adulthood, including depression, cardiovascular disease, rheumatoid arthritis, and neurodegeneration. The present talk will highlight key findings in this context to illustrate how differences in reactivity to social stress can shape lifespan health.

Biography: Dr. Slavich's research integrates methods from psychology, neuroscience, immunology, genetics, and genomics to elucidate the full set of psychological and biological mechanisms linking stress with poor health in adolescence and adulthood. Recent studies along these lines have examined how social stressors cause changes in psychological, neural, and immunologic processes that in turn increase risk for depression and related disorders. Dr. Slavich has also helped pioneer the burgeoning new field of human social genomics. He completed undergraduate and graduate coursework in psychology and communication at Stanford University, and received his Ph.D. in clinical psychology from the University of Oregon. After graduate school, he was a clinical psychology intern at McLean Hospital and a clinical fellow in the Department of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School. He subsequently completed three years of postdoctoral training in health psychology and psychoneuroimmunology at UCSF and then UCLA, where he has been a faculty member since 2010.

Dr. Doran French focuses on peer relationships and religiosity (especially in Indonesia, China, Thailand, and South Korea). Dr. Richard M. Lerner is renowned for his work on positive youth development (being advanced by Compassion International in Central and South America, Asia, and Africa). Dr. Frosso Motti-Stefanidi's expertise is in immigrant and refugee youth (especially in Greece and other European countries affected by the recent immigration crisis). Dr. Eugene C. Roehlkepartain has studied adolescents' non-family relationships in 30 countries. The moderator is Dr. Jennifer E. Lansford, who studies parenting and youth development and has consulted with UNICEF about parenting programs around the world. This roundtable emphasizes issues that are salient for adolescents in low- and middle-income countries and blends scientific knowledge on development with evidence from practical program and policy experience to inform understanding of risks to adolescent development and how to promote adolescents' positive development globally. Individuals working to improve one aspect of adolescent development are sometimes unaware of the range of barriers to effecting change in that domain. This roundtable brings together researchers who work on different aspects of adolescent development to exchange ideas and engage in lively discussion with the audience about risks and opportunities to promote adolescents' positive development around the world.

# 2-080. 2018 SRA Presidential Address - Moving Toward a Developmental Cultural Neuroscience of Adolescence

Abstract: The study of adolescence has been boosted and transformed by recent developments in neuroscience and related areas. These developments have occurred alongside the growth of a vibrant tradition of research on culture, race-ethnicity, and other aspects of diversity. Yet, with noteworthy exceptions, these two streams of inquiry have generally followed separate paths within our field. This address poses the question of how we might more fully integrate emerging knowledge of adolescent brain development with cultural models of development, with the dual goals of understanding the mechanisms through which culture gets under the skin and is "embrained" and uncovering the implications of this process for youth growing up in distinct cultural contexts.

Biography: Dr. Lisa Crockett is a Professor of Psychology at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln with expertise in adolescent risk behavior and Latino youth development. She received her B.A. from the University of Pennsylvania and her PhD in Human Development from the University of Chicago, and completed post-doctoral training at the Johns Hopkins School of Public Health. Her works focuses on individual and contextual variables contributing to the development of adolescent risk behavior among European American and Latino youth. This work has been funded by the National Science Foundation, NICHD, NIMH, and NIAAA. She serves on the editorial boards of Developmental Psychology, Cultural Diversity & Ethnic Minority Psychology, and the Journal of Early Adolescence and has served as associate editor of the Journal for Research on Adolescence. In addition to her faculty role she has held several administrative positions at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln including Associate Dean of Arts and Sciences and Associate Vice Chancellor for Research.

Integrative Statement: In the current racial climate, with widespread media attention to racial attitudes and racerelations in the United States, understanding how parents prepare children for the realities of race (and racialized dynamics in schools and communities) is timely and important. For the past 20 years, Dr. Diane Hughes' has conducted research on how adolescents learn race and how adults teach it. Her studies have sought to address the following questions: How do conversations about race take place in families? What is communicated, how often, and under what circumstances? Do messages from parents, in particular, influence how children view themselves, their intergroup relationships, or their academic or psychological adjustment? In this talk, Dr. Hughes will review her work on this topic. She will discuss the different types of messages parents transmit, variation in these messages for boys versus girls and for adolescents from different ethnic-racial groups, and the consequences across time of these messages for youths' academic engagement, self-esteem, and psychosocial adjustment.

Biography: Dr. Hughes is a professor of Applied Psychology in the Steinhardt School of Culture, Development, and Education and co-director of the Center for Research on Culture, Development and Education at New York University. Her research focuses on ethnic-racial dynamics within individuals, families, schools, and neighborhoods, focusing on topics such as ethnic-racial socialization, identity, and discrimination. Dr. Hughes conducts school- and community-based studies with adolescents and their parents using longitudinal and mixed methods designs.

# 3-002. Evidence Based Multiple Family Group Intervention for Adolescents and Families in Treatment

**Abstract**: In this workshop, we will consider several additions that can be made to basic prevention and intervention programs that might make them more effective in reducing problem behaviors and increasing prosocial behaviors over longer periods of time after the programs have ended. First, consider how individuals from infancy to adulthood manage their arousal when fashioning educational programs or clinical interventions to prevent/treat drinking, drug use, smoking or risky sexual behaviors of adolescents or adults. These behaviors are often the ones that are used to manage arousal that feels unbearable. To allow individuals to 'keep thinking' when they are highly aroused, not to move into a habitual response (fighting, fleeing), they must learn how to tolerate and manage the physiological arousal and to calm themselves. Once calm, they will be able to access the information they have learned in an intervention and make better decisions about how to deal with the situation. The process by which this can be accomplished is two-fold: 1) presentation and practice of micro-skills (noting physiological changes, stopping and doing nothing, accessing fear, having empathy, and risking vulnerability) within a group discussion; and 2) highly arousing role playing. By using this habitual response to physiological arousal perspective perhaps more permanent change in interactional patterns and resulting problem behaviors will ensue.

# 3-005. RDoC: A Lens for Understanding Changes in Adolescent Brain and Behavior

Integrative Statement: From suicidal ideation to delinquent behavior, Adolescence is a period where risk for psychopathology and associated behaviors increases dramatically. This uptick in psychopathology is linked to developmental shifts in the underlying cognitive, emotional, and social lives of adolescents. Increasingly sophisticated research in adolescent development has identified change in neural, physiological, and behavioral function and interactions across these levels of analysis during adolescence. In this symposium we examine adolescent functioning across several levels of analysis in four RDoC domains: Positive Valence Systems, Negative Valence Systems, Cognitive Processes, and Social Processes. Each talk will use multilevel measurement within one domain to link adolescent development to brain, behavioral, and interpersonal processes underlying risk for psychopathology. Biography: Margaret Sheridan, Ph.D., is an Assistant Professor of Psychology and Neuroscience at UNC Chapel Hill. She received her Ph.D. from the University of California, Berkeley in Clinical Psychology. The goal of her research is to better understand the neural underpinnings of the development of cognitive control across childhood (from 5-18 years of age) and to understand how disruption in this process results in psychopathology. In particular she studies how experiences of adversity shift brain development to lead to risk for psychopathology. Her research uses multimethod tools including longitudinal assessments, fMRI, EEG, and psychophysiology. Dr. Sheridan is the recipient of a Robert Wood Johnson Health and Society Scholar award and her research has been funded by the National Institutes of Health, NSF, Robert Wood Johnson, Dubai Cares, and NC TraCs. Dr Sheridan has published extensively, with over 80 publications and book chapters.

# 3-025. Interpersonal Risk (and Opportunity) During Adolescence: A Multi-level Perspective on the Emerging Gender Difference in Depression

Integrative Statement: Adolescence is a stage of life marked by striking transformations in the social worlds of youth. As they progress through adolescence, youth must traverse the increasingly intricate and emotionally demanding landscape of family, peer, and romantic relationships. Successfully meeting their basic need for relatedness during this pivotal period thus requires that youth possess strong personal and interpersonal resources. These complex social tasks of adolescence create a developmental context of risk for depression, particularly in girls. Yet, girls' heightened interpersonal sensitivity may confer many social benefits. This talk will explore the interpersonal context of adolescent depression from a multilevel perspective, considering how the intersection between psychological, biological, and contextual dimensions of interpersonal risk contribute to the emergence and continuity of depression across the transition through adolescence. Highlighting the trade-offs of girls' interpersonal sensitivity, I will also discuss how female-linked relationship processes can serve as resources that provide the opportunity to redirect adolescent girls toward healthier developmental pathways.

**Biography:** Karen D. Rudolph is a professor at the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. She received her doctorate in clinical psychology at UCLA and completed a clinical internship at the Neuropsychiatric Institute and Hospital at UCLA. She has been a recipient of a William T. Grant Foundation Faculty Scholars Award and a James McKeen Cattell Sabbatical Award, and has served as a PI and co-PI on several large-scale longitudinal studies funded by the National Institutes of Health. She serves on the editorial boards of Development and Psychopathology and Journal of Abnormal Child Psychology and has served as an associate editor for Journal of Clinical Child and Adolescent Psychology. In 2008, she served as Program Co-Chair for the SRA biennial meeting. Her research uses a multi-level, multi-method approach to examine person-by-environment interactions contributing to depression, with an emphasis on gender differences and developmental transitions that create a context of risk.

Integrative Statement: As adolescents spend an increasing amount of time in technologically mediated settings, adults are seeking to capitalize on unprecedented levels of engagement and access to young people provided by technology and new media environments to promote positive development. Rather than trying to persuade adolescents to turn off their devices (a nearly impossible task), a more fruitful approach may be to locate positive youth development interventions where youth are already spending their time-on their screens. However, numerous studies have found negative effects of technology/media use in adolescents, ranging from decreased emotional intelligence and empathy to higher envy, anxiety, and narcissism (Buffardi & Campbell, 2008; Krasnova, Wenninger, Widjaja, & Buxmann, 2013; Misra, Cheng, Genevie, & Yuan, 2016; Przybylski & Weinstein, 2013; Rosen, 2013). And yet technology and media are not going away, nor are potential benefits necessarily outweighed by negative effects. Several scientifically based media and technology products have been shown to promote positive development (e.g., Text-To-Connect, CharacterMe, Commons Sense Media, Arthur Interactive Media Product). Researchers and technologists can find productive ways to counter negative trends and use tech for positive development. Panelists will be asked to answer the Big Ouestion. How can new platforms and technology and media be used to promote positive development in adolescents? and they will address promises and pitfalls of developing science-based technology/media products that foster positive development. ## 3-053. Writing for a Non-Academic Audience: Underlying Assumptions and Strategies

Leader: Andrew P. Smiler

Integrative Statement: When trying to impart knowledge to others, it's vitally important to understand who those others are and the ways in which they are used to receiving information. Although APA Style is highly effective for communicating social science to other researchers who share the same background training, the format's assumptions do not translate well to blog-style posts written by academics for a general audience. APA style provides a format where a study's information is easily located and allows technical jargon regarding concept, procedures, and implications. Journalists and bloggers typically rely on a style that sequences the information based on its importance or interest to the audience, from most to least important, with little to no jargon. In this hands-on session, I briefly summarize these underlying assumptions and structures, while providing strategies researchers can employ when writing for a general audience. Attendees will have several structured opportunities to practice.

Biography: Andrew Smiler, PhD, is SRA's Editor-in-Chief for Online Publications, as well as a therapist in private practice and author. His therapeutic practice focuses on teens and young adults, serving natal males, male identified, and transgender clients. Dr. Smiler is the author of the award winning "Dating and Sex: A Guide for the 21st Century Teen Boy" (2016, Magination Press) and co-author, with Chris Kilmartin, of the best-selling Introduction to Men's Studies text "The Masculine Self" (5th ed). He is the author of more than 25 academic publications, focused primarily on male sexual development and measurement of masculinity. Through his research consultancy, he has published in the Journal of Dental Education and the International Journal of ePortfolio. Dr. Smiler attend the University of New Hampshire and completed a post-doc at the University of Michigan.

Integrative Statement: This roundtable brings together five panelists (Pamela Wridt, Anne Petersen, Colette Daiute, Renu Singh and Silvia Koller) with moderator Prerna Banati to discuss the importance of investing in adolescent development and identify ways to build adolescents' capacity. engagement, and participation, with a focus on low- and middle-income country settings. Evidence shows adolescents are skillful early adopters and able to innovate and navigate through complex challenges. However, too often, adolescents are engaged in tokenistic ways, undermining their potential, and devaluing their ability to contribute constructively. The group will discuss capacity building through individuals, organizations, and societies. National education systems bear the primary duty of providing skills and development for adolescents to reach their potential. However, in many countries enrollment is low or poor quality prevails. Capacity building is closely tied to adolescents' participation in decisions that affect their lives in addition to planning, executing, and evaluating initiatives geared toward youths. The panel will also discuss ways to promote approaches for engaging young people, such as being active participants in program design research, monitoring, and evaluation. Facilitating young people's participation as stakeholders in local and national development is mandated as part of the Sustainable Development Goals guiding the international development agenda through 2030 and is especially crucial because youths are now the largest demographic group in the world.

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

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

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
